CITY GAS SERVICE

The City Gas Department has today announced in our advertising columns this evening that there will be a continuous gas supply as from Monday next.

The LIMERICK LEADER learns that the works to the retorts at the Gas Works are now completed and, as a result, the full plant is in production. It is pointed out, however, that consumers must exercise rigid economy. If that was not done it would be necessary to resort to fixed rates for gas consumption. The Government felt, however, that with the co-operation of the public it would be possible to maintain the continuous service, which should be a great boon to consumers.
