Dear Sir or Madam,

Owing to the short time that remains to the day of poll in the above elections, and the vast area to be covered by personal canvass, I sincerely regret it is utterly impossible for me to call on each elector. I, therefore, ask your indulgence and consideration in this respect, and respectfully request you for a continuance of your support as you have done so in the past.

I have had the privilege of representing you on the City Council for the past 20 years (succeeding my late father, who was also a member for over 40 years). I claim to have at all times kept the interest of Limerick and its people ever to the forefront, and it has been my ambition and always will be to see that our city takes a leading part in the industrial, commercial and cultural life of our nation.

During my Mayoralty, the first real attempt to grapple with the building of houses for the working classes was undertaken, and houses were built at Prospect (Donnellan's Buildings) and Rossa Avenue, and lay-out work was commenced in the Island Field Scheme. A new and up-to-date water filtration and pumping system was installed and the water supply to the city was thus vastly improved and considerably increased. I as Mayor turned the first sod which established the great Dock Extension Scheme. I was very privileged to represent our city as Mayor during the Eucharistic Congress ceremonies in Dublin in 1932.

As Chairman of the Limerick City Vocational Committee for the past 15 years, I was instrumental in pushing ahead the extensions to the Schools in O'Connell Avenue, and the building of St. Anne's Vocational Schools in Charlotte Quay, which School is entirely devoted to the training of young girls in every phase of domestic life, and is of profound benefit to the many girl students attending the classes there and is the only one of its kind in any County Borough in the country.

I would ask you, therefore, to please remember those who have striven and are striving without any personal interest or gain to further the interest of our city, and to show by placing No. 1 before my name on the day of election that you deem me still worthy to represent you as a member of the City Council.

With very deep and sincere regret we chronicle the demise of Dr. Phyllis McDonnell, wife of Dr. L. V. McDonnell, Barrington St., Limerick, which took place on Saturday morning after a long illness.

The deceased lady, who was a daughter of the late Dr. Laurence Kelly, Merrion Square, Dublin, was held in the highest esteem and regard by a very wide circle of friends and associates. Her death in the prime of life has occasioned profound regret and sorrow, and the sympathy of the citizens is extended to her bereaved husband, children and family circle in their irreparable loss.

The funeral took place on Monday from St. Michael's Church, after Solemn Requiem Mass, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The cortege was of immense proportions, being representative of the professional and commercial classes, not only of the city and county, but of a much wider area. SHANAGOLDEN COURT

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DAMAGE TO TREES AND FENCES

At Shanagolden Court, on Wednesday, before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J.,

Two adjourned cases of breaches of the Licensing Laws against Edna Bridget Pasotti, Shanagolden, and Mrs. Mary O'Shaughnessy, Currobanebeg, Loughill, were called.

Supt. McKenna said the offences were committed in November last and the evidence in the cases had already been heard by the Justice, who adjourned them for six months. There was nothing against the defendants since.

Justice—In that case I will strike them out.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. P. T. Liston and Co.) appeared for Mary O'Shaughnessy.

John Dillane, Shanagolden, was charged with causing damage to trees and fences on the lands of Michael Madigan, Old Abbey, Shanagolden.

Two youths were charged in connection with the same offence, and one of them was further charged with causing damage to a gate, the property of James Downey, Briskagh.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. P. T. Liston & Co.), appeared for one of the boys.

James Downey said his lands adjoined those of Michael Madigan. On the day in question he found a gate had been lifted off its hinges and the defendants were in one of Madigan's fields collecting firewood. They ran away leaving their carts behind them.

Michael Madigan gave particulars of the damage done to trees on his lands. He gave Dillane's father-in-law permission to take some wood but it was not on that date and the place where he was to collect; it was a quarter of a mile away.

Dillane said he understood the permission was in respect of any day.
