AT ABBEYFEALE COURT

At Abbeyfeale Court, before Dis-
trict Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., there
were only a few cases for disposal.
Some others were adjourned on the
application of solicitors.

The case of Guard Lynch against
the parents of James Rennicks, a
schoolboy, which had been adjourn-
ed from the previous Court, for
his non-attendance at Abbeyfeale
N.S., was again called. The boy
went to school for seven days since
last Court and refused his parents
to go any longer.

The Justice now cautioned the
boy that if he did not resume
school he would commit him to an
industrial school, as he refused to
go to school for his parents.

Bridget Dunworth, who had been
summoned for abusive language
towards Patrick Healy, Meenoline,
and who declined to attend the
Court on two previous occasions,
was bound to the peace for two
years in £5 and two sureties.

A charge of abusive language
brought by Miss B. Cotter against
Michael Woulfe, Kilconlea, was dis-

OBITUARY

MR. PATRICK J. O'BRIEN.

Mr. Patrick Joseph O'Brien, aged
36 years, assistant manager, Drom-
banna Creamery, "Four Elms," for
14 years, died last Saturday morn-
ing in Barrington's Hospital, after
a rather long illness, which he bore
with patience and courage. His
funeral from St. Michael's Church
