## CENTRAL HEATING

Sweden's biggest heating plant intended for dwelling is situated in a suburb of Stockholm (says a writer in "Irish News"). It serves 26 flats, pumping no less than 100 gallons of hot water per hour through the pipe lines, and with consumption of fuel wood only the present shortage of wood amounts to 353,000 cubic ft. Thanks to an effective insulation of the pipe lines the loss of heat has been reduced to only a few degrees centigrade in the remote building, located 1 1/2 miles from the heating central. ## FATHER'S TRIBUTE TO IRELAND

A letter received from Rome from the Holy Ghost Fathers, Kimbrough from the Right Rev. Bishop of London, the Vicar-Apostolic of London, his Lordship refers to an interview he had with the Holy Father. His Holiness, the letter says, "that Catholic country, semper in the arms of its Government, so devoted in organising its life on Catholic principles," and "so devoted in its aid to the distressed countries of Europe." He repeats with the deepest feeling and joy: "Tell every man most consoled by Ireland." He contrasted Ireland with the other European countries where he sees terrible desolation and a "most sombre future." "I said to me," says Bishop Kimbrough, "that as the Holy Father had no opportunity of seeing the Bishops, he just used myself to convey to the Irish people his deep appreciation of their fidelity and generosity."
