

VEST SCHEME

Provide Help For Farmers

FOR SAVING THE CROPS

The object of making available adequate labour for the saving of the 1945 harvest, the harvest scheme which was so successful in 1944 will be again in operation this year to enable farmers to anticipate a shortage of labour for the saving of their crops and to arrange to obtain temporary labour from the congested portions of the counties of Cavan, Donegal, Galway, Leitrim, Limerick, Mayo, Monaghan and Sligo, men who are required in their own districts to attract such men to their farms temporarily to farmers in those areas who require them. The best co-operation on the part of both farmers and workers is essential for the success of the scheme. The Government will provide every man who travels under the scheme from his own district to take up harvest employment with a farmer:—

Free rail and bus travel from his own place of employment, and reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses of 5/- per journey, and a daily allowance for board and lodging allowance of 1/- per day, and free return travel to his own district plus out-of-pocket expenses on termination of his employment under the scheme.

Men who wish to obtain temporary employment for their harvest work under this scheme are requested to undertake the following:—

1. To employ the number of men required, and to pay the men a minimum wage of 1/2 per hour work plus 1/6 per hour for hours in excess of 54 per week.

2. To have available for the men board and lodging at a reasonable charge, which the men will pay.

3. It is essential that farmers who employ men should notify the requirements at once so that arrangements may be made with the men who are prepared to undertake the work. For the purpose of notifying their requirements farmers may obtain forms of application from:—

The Tillage Inspector or Tillage Adviser, or the Employment Exchange, or the Employment Office of the Department of Industry and Commerce, or the Post Office.

County Hurling Championship

At the Limerick Gaelic Grounds yesterday, the combined parish team Granagh-Ballingarry had a comparatively easy win over Fedamore in the third round of the county hurling championship.

Though the issue was never in doubt, there was excitement in abundance, especially in the second half, when Fedamore tried might and main to reduce the formidable lead of 6 goals 3 points to 1 goal 1 point. Their efforts proved unavailing, as the Granagh-Ballingarry men—all in the prime of their manhood—proved too strong a combination. It was a repetition of the age old story—the supremacy of youth over veterans.

In the opening stages the Western men had a riot of scoring, and when the short whistle came the register read:—

Granagh-Ballingarry—6-3.
Fedamore—1-1.

The second moiety was more evenly contested. The spate of scoring was reduced somewhat, and the spectators witnessed some brilliant and hectic passages. The final score was:—

Granagh-Ballingarry—7-7.
Fedamore—2-1.

The scoring was opened for Granagh-Ballingarry by Morrissey, who had two neat goals. Ryan for Fedamore replied with a goal. C. Daly added two goals and two points to the Western register, to which J. Daly added a goal and Noonan a goal and a point. Butler for Fedamore had a point.

In the second half the scorers for the winners were Chawke 1 goal; Mullane, 2 points; Morrissey, 2 points. For Fedamore Bulfin raised the green flag once.

TIPPERARY'S DECISIVE WIN

In the Munster senior hurling semi-final at Thurles yesterday, Tipperary had a decisive win over Cork, emerging victors of a great game by 2 goals 13 points to 3 goals 2 points. The attendance was returned at 15,000 and the gate receipts at £1,200.

Limerick now meet Tipperary in the final. On the toss of a coin between representatives of the two teams after yesterday's game as to whether the final should be played at Thurles or Limerick, Tipperary won, and at a subsequent meeting of the Munster Council Thurles was sanctioned as the venue, with Mr. P. O'Flaherty (Tullamore) as referee.
