WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, July 11th—Cattle—Numbers on market not up to last week, but more than a reasonable supply, and a good show. Usual attendance, both home and shipping interests fully represented. Beef in fair numbers; active trade, especially prime handy heifers, with rates well up to current prices. Young fresh cows in favour and readily cashed; secondary and older sorts met with demand, and ready exchange at satisfactory prices. Complete clearance in this section. In store section more useful drafts of feeders; well selected useful bullocks with condition found ready buyers. In the younger section shorter lengths; useful feeding bullocks and heifers in good condition and quality were in demand; smaller sorts were not quite so active as last week; plain and thin cattle difficult to sell. In the store section enquiry not quite as active as last week. Market wound up with a good finish, and substantial clearance in all sections. Fat heifers and bullocks, £25 to £29; fat cows, £24 to £28; first run, £17 10s. to £21 10s.; old, £8 10s. to £16 15s.; 3 year-old bullocks, £25 10s. to £28 10s.; 2 year-old bullocks and heifers, £15 5s. to £18 10s.; yearling bullocks and heifers, £11 10s. to £14 10s.
Sheep—A very full supply; all pens filled; a good amount of a useful character; firm tone and ready for choice pens, including heavy sheep. In this class there were a good many shown; current rates ruled. Well fed sheep with good quality wanted and easily cashed; prime sheep readily bid for; secondary and thinner sorts quite so much in favour; slightly easier prices. Fresh ewes with quality found buyers. Enquiry for feeding sheep. Choice fat lambs readily bid for; others quieter demand. On the day a steady selling trade; value on being fully maintained for prime lambs and lambs. Substantial turnover and ready clearance. Fat middle weight, 110/- to 112/-; small, 85/- to 87/6; hoggets, 110/- to 125/-; second run, 96/- to 100/-; small, 80/- to 87/6; stores, 72/6 to 80/-; ewes, 90/- to 98/6; second run, 65/- to 75/-; fat lambs, best, 68/- to 82/6; small, 50/- to 60/-.
