DAILY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Friday, July 18th—Cattle—A very full numerically more than last week; good beef; trade in this department well up in prices; handy weighted heifers and readily cashed, with good demand and competition for prime heifers. Suitable cows found ready customers; secondary sorts also met fair enquiry and a trade active and firm in this department. Practically all beef lots cleared early. Entry of strong cattle, bullocks with age and condition, especially pollies, easily sold at high rates; brisk trade for suitable bullock heifers not so much in favour; store cattle short of condition, quiet market entry of young stores; useful and heifers looked for and wanted at high prices; small and thin cattle met dull trade. Cows and bullocks, best, £24 10s. to £30; second run, £21 to £23 10s.; fat cows, £16 15s. to £18; second run, £10 to £14 5s.; 2 year-old bullocks, £22 5s. to £27 10s.; second run, £15 to £22; 2 year-old bullocks and yearlings, small, £13 17s. 6d. to £17; yearlings, small, £8 5s.

Numbers showed a slight decrease, but a more than seasonable entry. Strong entry of buyers, including many from a distance; trade firm and active for prime pens, heavy sheep, in which class there were a good many shown; full current rates for well fed hoggets and wethers met with competition, and top prices of last day were obtained. All round steady trade for the trade; prime sheep were readily sold for and wanted. Fresh ewes with good buyers; feeding sheep also met with enquiry. Choice fat lambs bid for, and store lambs in fair demand at late prices. The general run of business was firm; most sold up. Substantially increased in price last year. Fat middle weight; 90/- hoggets, best, 110/- to 123/6; second run, 80/- to 108/-; small, 80/- to 96/-; fat lambs, 70/- to 75/-; second run, 45/- to 55/-.

CAHIRMEE FAIR

Big Attendance of Buyers

Easing of the emergency and the welcome return of cross-country buyers, after a six years absence, indicated a marked revival in the Cahirmee old world-famed horse fair, which opened in Buttevant on Tuesday, 10th inst., and provided enlivened scenes up to Wednesday night.

Principal amongst the buyers were:—Captain Palmer, Martock, Somerset; Messrs. Albert James Sciencester, Gloucester; Riordan Brothers, Lewes; John and Michael Parkill, Clones; Pat McEntee, Clones; T. Granton, West Grinstead; W. McGee, Dublin; Stephen White, Liffey Bank, Dublin; T. O'Donnell, Buttevant; David Hovey, Brook Lawn, Dublin; David McCaldin, Banbridge; B. Laveroy, Moy; James Kenny, Dundalk; Cooper, Dublin; J. McEvoy, Balward, Co. Down; William Murphy, John Morgan, Waterford; Doonan Brothers, Limerick; M. Crehan, Limerick; Tim Horgan, Cork; Rohan, Cork.

Riordan Brothers, Lewes, were purchasers of 17 handsome hunters 4 to 6 years, at from £52 10s. to £150 each.

Mr. Stephen White, Liffey Bank, Dublin, bought up to twenty horses in this class, or up to 8 years like to make hunters and chasers.

Mr. Thomas O'Donnell, Mount View, Buttevant, who had as visitor Captain Palmer, Martock, Somerset, bought and sold many valuable animals.

Strong horses and cobs for draught, farming and harness were sold at £25 to £50; ponies £18 to £30.

Horses in the fair, occupying the Main Street, fully, were from several widely divided centres as Nenagh, Newcastlewest, Kilmallock, Middleton, etc.

Duhallow's universal reputation was re-asserted in a fine quota of blood animals and exhibits were from the near and furthermost parts of Cork, Kerry and Limerick. Loadings at Buttevant Railway Station were more than double last year's figures.
