INTERESTING LABOUR
PAMPHLET

"Labour in the National Struggle" (Labour Party, 6d.)—with a foreword by W. Norton, T.D., is the story told by R. M. Fox of the part played by organised workers in the turbulent days when the battle for Irish Freedom was being fought. (writes a special correspondent) It tells how Connolly led his Citizen Army—originally a strikers' Defence Force—into the Easter Insurrection. As a background to that shining page of Irish history we are told of Connolly's distinctive ideas and his view of what Irish Labour should achieve through national freedom. This places him in his proper relation to earlier democratic leaders—Wolfe Tone, Fintan Lalor, Michael Davitt.

Not only did Irish workers take their full share in the armed struggle but, in the Anti-Conscription Movement in 1918, a remarkable demonstration of solidarity by men and women workers—expressed in a nation-wide protest strike—killed the threat of conscription. Strikes for the releases of prisoners—held by the Black-and-Tans—were a valuable part of Labour's contribution. So, too, was the refusal of dockers and railwaymen to transport munitions or British armed forces in Ireland. Thousands of these workers were victimised. Labour also took steps to conserve Ireland's food for her own people. Sometimes these steps were drastic.
