### MRS. MADDEN, CANAL BANK.

An old link with Limerick's past is severed by the death of Mrs. Catherine Madden, which took place on Wednesday, August 15th, at her residence, Canal Bank, Limerick.

The deceased lady had reached an advanced age, and her passing will be deeply regretted by the many friends, old and young, who visited the house on the Canal Bank, which was a popular rendezvous—a landmark—for residents and Gaels of the district, and a refuge for those on the run during the stirring period of the Black and Tan War. All who visited the old house on the Shannon's banks were assured of a real Irish welcome and many pleasant hours were spent amongst friends who will long cherish the kindness and the ready wit of the dear old lady who has now passed to her eternal reward. The deceased, who retained her faculties to the last, passed away as she lived, peacefully.

She was the mother of a large and highly respected family. Her son, John, was a member of the Limerick team that played Wexford in the memorable 1910 hurling final, and afterwards captained the Limerick exiles hurling team in New York for seven years. His brother Michael, played with the Cloughnaun and Limerick County hurling teams. Denis is proprietor of the Garryowen Transport Co., Dublin, and is widely known as the inventor of the device for lifting submerged submarines, and the designer of a life-saving jacket, plans of which have been submitted to the British and American Admiralties. Several members of the family (some of who are deceased) were responsible for saving many lives from drowning in the Shannon, at Plassy.

The funeral will take place from St. Patrick's Church to-morrow (Saturday), at 3 o'clock, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

The chief mourners were—Mr. Peter O'Flaherty (husband); Mr. and Mrs. McDonough (parents); Patrick and Christopher (brothers).

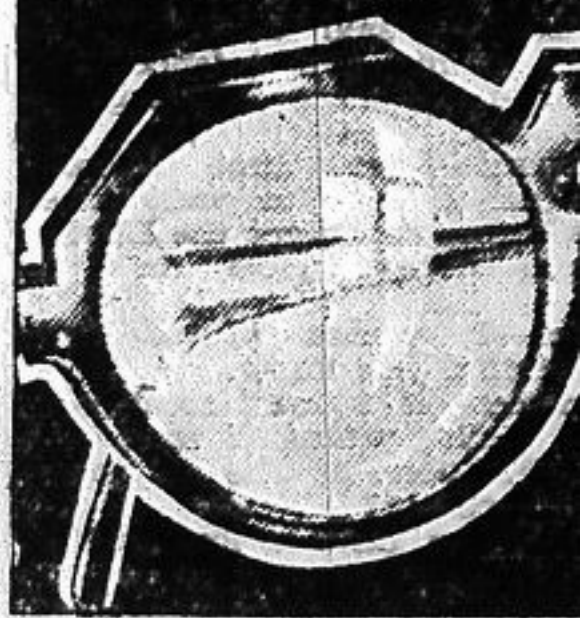
