

BUSY SEASON

Limerick Musical Club

The seventh annual general meeting of the Limerick Musical Club was held in the George Hotel on Tuesday, Mr. M. H. Franklin, B., presiding.

The following report on the season 1945 was presented to the members by Miss Mary Duggan on behalf of the Committee.

The Committee have pleasure in presenting to the members their report on the activities of the Limerick Musical Club for its seventh season. They wish to thank all members whose continued support during the difficult past years made it possible to keep the club going in spite of the many restrictions necessarily imposed as a result of the war. They trust that membership will now increase and the club may be able to continue to function for many years to come. The membership now stands at 110.

During the past season six recitals were given from October to April, 1945, and the string orchestra under the baton of Mr. M. Franklin with Mr. Granville as leader, again gave a good account of itself, appearing at all of the six recitals. The Committee once more would ask members to endeavour to get string players to join the orchestra.

During the season thirty members of the club appeared at the six recitals, exclusive of the members of the orchestra, and of taking part in the vocal ensemble. The latter appeared in the March and April, 1945, programmes, and were much appreciated. In each case an item was added with accompaniment by orchestra. It is interesting to note that music by 48 different composers, ranging from early classical to modern, was heard at the six recitals given.

The officers and committee for 1946 to be elected to-night will be very glad if suggestions will be put to them in connection with the management of the club in general, and in particular they ask members to come forward at any time and volunteer items for performance at any of the recitals in the coming season."

A report was adopted unanimously.

WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, September 11th—Considerably increased numbers. The proportion of cows more than heifers. A strong and most representative attendance, and purchasers had number of choice cows and heifers to select from; the entry being the best seen at Paddocks for some time. Business open firm; a steady and even trade ruled for right stamp of cow or heifer, which were quickly. Choice cows attracting ready attention and evoked spirited competition; buyers being willing to give top rates for top. Active demand for choice and promising cows and more of this class could have been sold. There were a number of buyers present willing such. Choice heifers also drew keen competition at the higher rates, and nicely balanced soft heifers with colour were well and bid for. Choice lots were keenly contested for, purchasers willing to give best rates and full values. More of this class looked over. Mr. John McDonnell, Killeen, Kilcornan, opened the market for dairy cows at £42 10s., runner-up being Mr. A. Griffin, Cloran, Dunguaire, at £38 10s. In the in-calf heifer section Major and Mrs. Hastings, Friarstown, Limerick, gained premier honours at £43, and for two particularly choice in-calf heifers which attracted marked attention. Competitively on the points of value and merit price were the highest touched this season. Substantial volume of business transacted, and very good clearance effected. The turnover showing 50 per cent. increase on the corresponding sale last year. Dairy cows, cheap, £35 to £42 10s., promising, £28 to £34 10s.; ordinary, £18 10s. to £27; in-calf heifers, choice, £34 10s. to £43; promising, £27 to £34 10s.; ordinary, £18 10s. to £25 10s.; small, £14 to £18.—Wm.
