Michael Durack, the defendant, said he had about 14 acres of bog, and Geoghegan had about 5 acres. The portion where Geoghegan cut turf was on witness's property and witness cut turf on that particular place about four years ago and there was no objection,

The Justice said that neither party had shown him title to the place and it looked as if no one knew who the owners were. Durack had constituted himself into judge, ury and sheriff. The time to make in objection was when Geoghegan went to cut the turf, but instead of doing that Durack waited until he man had it cut and saved and icked.

Mr. Molony said that the man ould hardly be blamed for taking is own property. He was about to oring proceedings to establish his itle.

The Justice ordered that Durack bay the sum of £6 with 12/6 exenses to Geoghegan before the ext Court, otherwise he would end him to prison for a month,

### REMANDED IN CUSTODY

Two men have been taken into custody in connection with the death of a man who died in the Limerick Co. Infirmary on the 16th The deceased, Cornelius O'Rourke, lived at Convent Street, Abbeyfeale.

On Monday, at Abbeyfeale, two brothers named Richard Garrett Failey were arrested arising out of O'Rourke's death. were brought before Mr. T. Warren, P.C., and remanded to the Tarbert Court to-morrow on the capital charge.

THE INQUEST. Mr. J. S. McNeice, solicitor, Deputy City Coroner, with a jury,

opened an inquest at the County Infirmary into the death O'Rourke. Following evidence of identifica-

tion and medical evidence, the inquest was adjourned on application of the Garda authori-

Dr. C. Molony, Limerick, stated that the deceased was admitted to the County Infirmary on August 9th. His face and eyes were bruised and he was suffering from shock. There was a serious injury of the right ankle, where the joint was completely open on the inside. The foot was dislocated. Witness did a plastic operation of the joint as soon as possible, and things looked well up to the time he left on holidays. He carried out an intensive treatment with a view to avoiding sepsis, including the use of penicillin. Despite that, sepsis and gangrene set in at the foot, Deceased's condition was very poor so far as vitality was concerned, eventually occurred and death from virulent septecemia.

Dr. J. L. Lang, Acting House Surgeon, County Infirmary, gave evidence of assisting Dr. Molony to perform a post-mortem operation, and agreed with the conclusions reached by him.

Mrs. Julia Leahy, Abbeyfeale, daughter of the deceased, gave evidence of identification. Her who was 64 years of age, owned licensd premises a Abbeyfeale and a farm outside the town, which he worked up to August 9th. Deceased had been in very good health.

At this stage the Inquest was adjourned. A POPULAR MAN.

O'Rourke, aged 60 years, whose death took place at the Limerick County Infirmary on Saturday (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent). His death is much regretted by numerous relatives and friends in West Limerick and Kerry. Many expressions of sympathy have been tendered to his daughter and immediate relatives. The interment took place in St. Mary's Cemetery, where the prayers at the graveside were recited by the Vry Rev. Canon Carroll, P.P., V.F., assisted by the Rev. J. Halpin, C.C., and Rev. R. Harnett, U.S.

#### LIMERICK NOT IN LUCK

When the draw for the 55th Irish Hospitals Trust Sweepstake on the Curragh Nursery Handicap opened in the Sweepstakes Hall, Ballsbridge, to-day, Mr. J. O Sheahan, announced that the total proceeds of the first ten-shilling sweep since the beginning of the war amounted to £586,081, an increase of £212,174 over the proceeds of the last sweep.
