## KILLED BY BULL

### ABBEYFEALE FARMER'S

### TRAGIC END

Shortly after returning home on Tuesday evening from Abbeyfeale, where he had transacted some business, Mr. Edmond T. Leahy, of Ballybehy, Abbeyfeale, was attacked by a bull in a field where he had gone to see some cattle. The bull had been chained, and the servant man found Mr. Leahy still holding the bull by the nose and severely injured. He died after receiving spiritual and medical aid. His death is much regretted in the dis- trict by numerous friends and relatives.

## BELSEN TRIAL

### WITNESS IN TEARS

A Polish woman doctor — a jewess—to-day told the British Military Court which is trying Josef Kramer and forty-four asso- ciates of the Belsen-Auschwald Camps that 4,500 out of 5,000 people interned with her died in the guards' chamber.

She was the first witness at the fifth day of the trial, and was in tears as she described how her mother, brother and young son of six were among those who died in the Belsen gas chamber. She added that altogether 25,000 were sent away from her town.

## DR. MORAN RESIGNS

### TWO POSITIONS VACANT

### HINT FOR LIMERICK CAPITALISTS

A suggestion that a factory might be established in Limerick for th manufacture of artistic pottery ha been made to the Limerick Chambe of Commerce.

At the meeting of the Chamber on Monday, Mr. J. O'Keeffe, Pres- dent, presiding, it was announce that a letter had been received from an ex-employee of the Bellee Pottery Co., desiring to interes Limerick in the financing of th establishment of a factory for th production of artistic pottery, sim- lar to Belleek, and informing th Chamber that this pottery could b started for £6,000, all the necessar labour and raw materials bein available in the Twenty-Six Count- area. The writer added that he ca guarantee a return of not less th 30 per cent per year, after clearin all the necessary overhead charges.
