

LATE CORPORAL THOMAS MINIHAN

The death, which occurred through drowning during last week, of Corporal Thomas Minihan, aged 23, was heard with much regret in Croom and the surrounding district where deceased was most popular (writes our Croom correspondent). It was only recently that Corporal Minihan was transferred to Limerick. The remains were removed to Croom Church on Saturday last, and the funeral on Sunday was of huge proportions. Deceased was given a full military funeral, which included Colonel Feely.

MR. MAURICE J. BROWNE, ABBEYFEALE.

There was a very large attendance of the public at the funeral of the late Mr. Maurice J. Browne, of the Square, Abbeyfeale, whose death took place after a fortnight's illness in his 70th year. At the interment next day the attendance was equally large. A respected trader, associated with the business of the town for fifty years, his death was much regretted by a large circle of friends and relatives. excluding the legitimate merchants and tradesmen of the city. In disgust, the merchants and tradesmen left the city and built the still beautiful Georgian town of Newtown Pery, on the slobs of the Prior's Land, once the property of the Augustinian Canons Regular, but granted to Pery's ancestor, Edmund Sexton, by Henry VIII. Davis Duckart, presumably a dutchman, who had designed Limerick's most beautiful and most neglected building, the Custom House, was responsible for the lay-out of the new town. The Corporation tried hard to have the town included under their rule, but they failed, and in 1807 it was put under the rule of a separate body of Commissioners.

BUILDING OF THE TOWN HALL.

All these reforms were accomplished by the Guild of Merchants who, until 1805, continued to meet at their old meeting place in Quay Lane. In that year, by public subscription, they built Limerick's second most graceful building, the present Town Hall, and constituted themselves the Commercial Building Company. Ten years later, on 2nd June, 1815, they were incorporated by royal charter "The Chamber of Commerce of Limerick." John MacNamara was the first President, Thomas Westropp the first Vice-President, and Martin Creagh, Joseph Fisher, William Hill, William White, Alan Francis O'Neill and Thomas Kelly its first directors.

When we remember that this was fourteen years before Catholic Emancipation, it may be seen from the names alone how liberal and broadminded the Chamber was from the beginning.

The struggle against corporate corruption was continued, first by the Lord Glentworth, then by John Howley and John Tuthill, who was afterwards bought over by the
