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## CO. LIMERICK BISHOP

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### PASSES AWAY IN INDIA

Widespread regret has been caused by the announcement that Most Rev. Dr. Timothy Crowley, D.D., Bishop of Dacca, Bengal, India passed away in his diocese on 2nd inst. Aged 65 years, he was son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Crowley, Kilmallock, and had a very brilliant career as a student and a Churchman. He made his final studies in the United States, where he was ordained in 1906. He was consecrated Titular Bishop in 1927 and Bishop of Dacca the following year. A saintly and kindly Prelate, he was beloved by the people of whose spiritual welfare he was the wise and energetic guide and director. His death removes a great Church figure and the deepest sympathy is extended to his numerous and highly respected relatives in the home district of Kilmallock and elsewhere. Two of his nephews are priests—Rev. D. Crowley, C.C., Kilfinane and Rev. P. Crowley, C.C., Rathcoole, Dublin. He was pre-deceased by two of his brothers, Mr. P. Crowley, Brisheen, Kilmallock, and Mr. William Crowley, who carried on for years a very successful drapery business at William Street, Limerick. Surviving brothers are Mr. Patrick Crowley, Athlacca and Mr. David Crowley, draper, Charleville.
