LATE MR. W. F. LEE

Huge Funeral Cortège

The funeral of the late Mr. W. F. Lee, ex N.T. Castleconnell, which took place to Castleconnell Cemetery on Saturday last, was one of the largest and most representative seen in the district for a considerable time, and was attended by people in all walks of life. G.A.A. officials and players taking precedence. Shops were closed and blinds drawn as the cortège wound its way to lay at rest one of the most popular figures in Co. Limerick.

FRAUD CHARGES

Before Circuit Judge

The issuing of cheques for turkey prices figured in allegations of fraud made against two defendants put forward before Judge Barra O'Brian at Limerick Circuit Court on Tuesday. The two accused concerned are Daniel Casey, Ballagh, and Thomas O'Connell, Meenakilla, Abbeyfeale, who were employees of the Kantoher Creamery Society at the time of the alleged offences. Casey pleaded guilty on Tuesday and was put back for sentence. The case against O'Connell was then opened and was continued on Wednesday and concluded on Thursday.

Daniel J. Casey, Ballagh, Co. Limerick, a clerk formerly employed by Kantoher Co-operative Dairy and Agricultural Society, Ltd., was charged with the embezzlement and fraudulent conversion of three sums of money, amounting to 17 s. 8d., and received by him on behalf of his employers.

Mr. T. Donovan, B.L. (instructed by Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor), prosecuted, and Mr. Wm. Leahy, solicitor, appeared for the accused. Accused, who pleaded guilty, was put back for sentence.

Casey was further charged with Thomas O'Connell, Meenakilla, Abbeyfeale, former creamery branch manager at Garryduff, with conspiracy to defraud the Kantoher Co-operative Agricultural Society of sums of 18 16s., £28 15s. 8d. and £11 by issuing forged cheques drawn to fictitious persons alleged to have sold turkeys to the Society.

Casey pleaded guilty to the charges of conspiracy, uttering the forged cheques and demanding money on cheques, knowing them to have been forged.

O'Connell pleaded not guilty to the charges of conspiracy to defraud, forging the cheques and falsification of accounts.

Mr. T. Donovan, B.L. (instructed by Mr. J. J. Power, State Solr.) prosecuted.

Mr. Nolan Whelan, S.C., with Mr. G. Lee, B.L. (instructed by Mr. M. J. K. Dore, solr.) appeared for O'Connell; Mr. W. Leahy, solr., for Casey; Mr. Maurice V. Fitzgerald, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Tynan and Co., solrs.) held a watching brief on behalf of the Kantoher Society.

O'Connell was found guilty on all counts and recommended to mercy.

Sentencing Casey to eighteen months imprisonment with hard labour his Lordship said the only thing in his favour was that he had pleaded guilty.

O'Connell was sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment with hard labour. The Judge said there were some things in his favour, but he (the Judge) would have been far more impressed had he adopted another course. Rarely did he comment on a jury's verdict but he wished to say in this case that he agreed with the findings.

Leave to appeal was granted in O'Connell's case.
