CHILD'S TRAGIC DEATH

A little girl, Angela Ryan, aged nine years, who lived at 15 Hogan Avenue, Kileely, Limerick, died on Friday night from injuries received following a burning accident.

It would appear that Angela, with other children, was left in the house in charge of a girl named Christina Murray, aged 13 years, while Mrs. Ryan was out shopping. Christina had occasion to go to an outhouse for fuel, and during her brief absence Angela, it is said, stuck a dry stick into the fire. When this was ignited she pulled it out, the flame setting her clothes on fire. Hearing her screams, Christina Murray hurried back into the house to find the child enveloped in flames, which she endeavoured to extinguish. In her frenzy, however, Angela, now a mass of flame, rushed out into the street. Her wild career was checked by a neighbour, Mr. Mortell, who, with the assistance of willing hands, had the burning clothes removed. The child was rushed to the City Home Hospital, where she died a few hours later. The child's father is at present in England.

An inquest will be held to-morrow by Dr. J. P. Cleary, Coroner for East Limerick.
