FATAL SEIZURE IN CHURCH

While Rev. Father McCarthy, C.C., was celebrating last Mass in Glin Church yesterday (writes our Glin correspondent) he was called to administer the Last Sacraments to Mr. Thomas Looney, pensioner of the Scots Guards, London, who had a seizure in the church, dying almost immediately. Mr. Looney was attended also by Dr. O'Connell, who is doing locum tenens for Dr. J. Barrett, M.O., who is on holidays. Mr. Looney served in the Great War and was through the Continent during that time. Deceased was an exemplary man, who throughout his life at Glin was a daily attendant at Mass and evening devotion. Rev. Father McCarthy paid a high tribute to deceased while asking the prayers of the congregation during Mass. The greatest sympathy is offered his brother, Mr. Michael Looney, shopkeeper, Tillyleague, Glin. The remains of deceased were conveyed to his home at Glin Castle Lodge. Deceased was in bad health for some time past.
