

scraps. This is cleaner and better than tea-leaves, and it brightens the carpet-colours.

BURNT SAUCEPAN.

Never fill a burned enamel saucepan with soda-water, for though this will remove the burnt portion, it will also make the pan more likely to burn again the next time it is used. Use salt instead of soda. Fill the saucepan with cold water and a tablespoonful of salt and bring slowly to the boil, and the pan will be quite clean, while there will be no bad after-effects.

LADY DOCTOR KILLED IN GERMANY

Dr. Margaret Mary Loughnan, R.A.M.C., elder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loughnan, Ballybricken, Wilton Road, Cork, was killed on Christmas Day in a motor accident in Germany, where she was serving with the British Occupation Forces. Dr. Loughnan qualified at University College, Cork, in 1937, and after a period at Wolverhampton Infirmary joined the R.A.M.C.

HEART TROUBLE CURED BY PENICILLIN

According to Professor Biggart, Dean of Medicine at Queen's University, Belfast, research in the use of penicillin for the treatment of heart troubles has yielded satisfactory results. Up to the present, he stated on Friday, they had twelve patients, who had walked out of hospital free from infection, so far as the doctors could tell.

SCHOOLBOYS SAVE 'PLANE CREW

CYCLIST FOUND DEAD

Francis Ryan, aged 44 and single of Carrownakilla, Newmarket-on-Fergus, met his death under tragic circumstances on St. Stephen's Day. He was cycling to Inig, and at a dangerous bend was thrown into a swamp that adjoins the road and is actually level with it. Apparently he got entangled in his bicycle and was unable to release himself. He was found by Thomas Canny, of Inig, but was dead at the time. At an inquest on Thursday, before Dr. Stephen Scanlan, Coroner for East Clare, a verdict of accidental death was returned, and sympathy tendered to his relatives. The deceased left home at 10.30 and was found by Mr. Canny at 11.15, so that he must have been only a very short time in the water.

EGYPT WANTS FULLER SHARE

The Egyptian Government, according to a Reuter message, has decided not to sign the reparations agreement reached at the Paris Conference unless Egypt's share is increased.

TYPEWRITERS 31/- EACH

Two Bavarian factories are to produce plastic typewriters to sell at 31/- each. The new machine, it is claimed, will not be inferior to present typewriters. Production is expected to begin in four months.
