Labourer's Death

Sequel to Motor Accident

Inquest Evidence

Dr M J O'Connor, Kilmallock, Deputy Coroner for East Limerick, held an inquest on Patrick Mao e, 60, married labourer, of The Grove, Churchtown, Newcastle West, who died in Croom Mospital following injuries received when, while carrying corn in his cart with his brother on the 24th September, he was struck by a motor car on the Newcastle West-Ardagh road.

Michael Moore, brother of the deceased stated that he was belping his brother, who was putting his corn into witness s berg on the 24th Sep; they had a donsey and cart, in which witness and his brother were sitting, as they went from the yard out on to the road; "We were almost on our proper side when I saw a motor car a moderate rate," said witness; "it struck mybrother where he was sitting in the cart; the motor stopped and reversed; decessed was caught between the motor car and the cart; he was groaning, and he fell off the cart on to the road; I k e. . wour it, the driver of the motorcar and to took my brother to the Creaty it was the art was not damaged, and the danke, dy klaned his knees where he feli; I do or know whether the hera was sounded or not, but t might have been."

Garda Purceli, Newcastle West, stated that there was; a bad bend near the scene, and a purson couning from Newcastle Westworld not have a good view of the gate where the donkey and cart came out.

Sergt W Hurley, Croom, said the car

was found to be in perfect order.

The Deputy Coroner suggested that a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence be returned, namely, that death was due to cardiac failure and shock, following fracture of humerus and femur, assentiated by the general condition of the deceased, which appears to have been poor for some time previous to his death.

The jury (foreman, Mr L Jones) agreed and broug t in a verdict in accordance

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
