DEATH OF MR. H. CREMIN

We regret to announce the death
of Mr. Henry Cremin, which took
place at his residence, 56, Henry St.,
Limerick, on the 23rd December.
The late Mr. Cremin was fifty years
in the employment of Messrs.
William Todd & Co., Ltd., Limerick,
for twenty years of which he was
buyer of their furniture department.
In his younger days he took a keen
