TILLAGE ORDER

QUALITY OF THE LAND QUESTIONED

Joseph Frawley, of Clonmore, Darragh, an elderly farmer, was charged before District Justice D. F. Gleeson at Ennis on Friday, with failing to till his quota of land during 1945.

Evidence was given that defend- ant had 112 acres of land, and of this acreage 25 acres were arable. He should have tilled eight acres and had only tilled 3 1/2.

Mr. I. M. Houllhan, solicitor, who defended, asked Mr. Finnegan, a Tillage Inspector, who had given evidence, was he aware that, accord- ing to a schedule issued by the Land Commission when a fair rent was being fixed, there was no tillage land at all on the holding.

Witness replied that he had not seen the schedule but that this was land a farmer would not till in ordinary times, but it should be tilled during an emergency.

Inspector M. O'Kane said he had been 40 years dealing with land and acted as a buffer between tillage inspectors and tenant farmers. This was not prime land, but it was till- age land. Referring to the Land Commission schedule, he said that at the time fair rents were being fixed farmers did not want the land to look well and allowed it to deteriorate, because the worse the land the lower the rent. There was worse land in many parts of the country than this and it had been successfully cultivated. Inspectors of the Department had inspected about 130,000 holdings, and if land such as this was not classed as tillage land, then about 60,000 or 70,000 holdings could be cut out as not being tillage lands, which would be a very serious matter.

Defendant gave evidence that manure had not been available, and without such it would have been useless to till the farm. He had used all the manure he had at his disposal to till the four acres.

District Justice Gleeson said the defendant failed to appreciate his responsibilities to the public, and in times like these he must till, even though it may pay him better not to do so. He (Justice) imposed a fine of £30.

Mr. M. J. Walshe State Solicitor, who prosecuted, informed the Jus- tice that defendant had been fined £5 in 1944 for a similar offence.
