

STRIKES IN THE UNITED STATES

A New York message received to-day says that the meat supply of the United States is seriously interrupted in consequence of a strike of 268,000 meat packers who left work this morning.

Throughout the country there are now on strike 870,000 men.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT
