DAILY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Monday, January 23rd—Decreased numbers this week. Strong and representative selection of export and home buyers; nice quality of beef, which met a ready sale and fetched top rates; nicely fed bullocks and well done heiferish cows in brisk demand at full previous rates; suitable young stores found ready customers. Old and young sorts for canning were in strong demand at advanced rates. Stores with age and condition found willing purchasers at full rates. More strong cattle could easily have been sold. Small entry of young stores. Enquiry for nice two year-old bullocks and heifers of the right stamp. Prices maintained with a firm tendency. Fair trade for useful young cattle. Yearlings with shapes and colour in good demand. Market almost sold up. Fat heifers, first run, £23 10s. to £29; second run, £26 to £30; second run, £18 10s. to £22; 3 year-old, £11, to £17 10s.; 3 year-old and heifers, £20 to £26 5s.; 2 year-old and heifers, £14 to £18; second run, £13; yearlings, £5 1s. to £8 13s. Full supply. Good sheep in the market. Usual attendance. Well fed wethers in demand. Prices worked out on the same basis as last week; all round trade firm and brisk. Prime wethers and brisk selling trade.
