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Later in the day, Mr. Kenny intimated that Mr. Hayes would consent to a stay provided that the queue is formed on the outside of the path in a single file.

Mr. O'Donovan said that he had received instructions to appeal, and his clients in the meantime would find some considerable trouble in regulating the queues as desired.

The Judge said he would give a stay of execution for 10 days in the event of the appeal being lodged.

Mr. S. Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Mr. D. J. O'Malley, solr.), appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. J. McMahon, B.L. (instructed by Mr. D. G. O'Donovan, solr.), appeared for the defendants.

In addition, it must take whatever steps are necessary, and take them at once, to give this city the benefit of a fully operating Conciliation Board to maintain good relations between workers and employers.
