It is with sincere and deep regret that we chronicle the sad passing on Thursday, 24th ult., of Mr. Wm. Carey, Parnell Street, Limerick, and his daughter, Mrs. T. Carroll, who passed away later on the same day.

It was an extremely poignant happening, and many messages of condolence from a wide circle of friends in the social and business life of the city have been tendered to the bereaved wife, family and relatives. Of a most retiring disposition, Mr. Carey was a member of an old-established Limerick family. Watchmaker and jeweller by vocation, he enjoyed a large measure of popularity, which marked him as of courteous and amiable character. He passed peacefully to his reward to be followed by his daughter, who was held in high esteem amongst her acquaintances of the younger generation.

THEY HELPED IN I.R.A. DAYS

Mrs. Mary Enright, who died at her residence Newpark, Croagh, on the 19th inst., was the relict of the late Mr. Thomas Enright. She was the mother of Mr. Chris Enright, an active member of the I.R.A. during the War of Independence, and Mrs. W. O'Sullivan (then Miss Josie Enright), who also did her share as a member of the Cumann na mBan. During those critical and dangerous times, the home of Mrs. Enright was open at all times to give shelter and hospitality to men "on the run," whose life was forfeit if captured by the enemy. Two daughters of the deceased are nuns in the teaching order of the Sisters of Mercy. There was a very large attendance when the remains were removed to Croagh Church, on Saturday evening, 19th inst., and again when the interment took place in the New Cemetery, Rathkeale, on Sunday. The prayers at the graveside were read by Rev. T. Murphy, P.P., assisted by Rev. H. O'Connor, P.P.; Rev. P. C. Lynch, P.P.; Rev. Fr. Enright, C.C., and Rev. Fr. O'Connor, O.F.M.
