During those critical and dangerous times, the home of Mrs. Enright was open at all times to give shelter and hospitality to men "on the run," whose life was forfeit if captured by the enemy. Two daughters of the deceased are nuns in the teaching order of the Sisters of Mercy. There was a very large attendance when the remains were removed to Croagh Church, on Saturday evening, 19th inst., and again when the interment took place in the New Cemetery, Rathkeale, on Sunday.
