### BUT LATE FOR FATHER'S FUNERAL

A young Killaloe girl, Miss Adza Vincent, who is announcer at the Singapore Radio Station, which is under the control of Lord Louis Mountbatten, Commander-in-Chief, South-East Asia, made a dash across the 10,000 miles of the world to be in Limerick for her father's funeral, but, due to the plane being held up in France because of bad weather she was a few days late.

Her father, Lieut-Colonel Hodgins (Miss Vincent uses her mother's name for stage and radio; her mother was the famous concert soprano, Kathleen Vincent) who was for years a veterinary surgeon at Nanagh, had died at Barrington's Hospital, Limerick.

Immediately Miss Vincent got notice she set out for Ireland, Lord Mountbatten placing certain facilities at her disposal.

The first civilian to enter Singapore Radio Station after the Japanese had left, she had previously been an announcer on the B.B.C. Early during the war Miss Vincent completed a lecture tour of India on behalf of the British Government.
