KILLED IN HAND-TO-HAND ENCOUNTER

The British War Office has
posthumously awarded the Victoria
Cross to Lieutenant the Hon.
Christopher Furness, Welsh
Guards, "for a magnificent act of
self-sacrifice" during the with-
drawal from Arras in 1940. When
wounded, he fought on alone
against hopeless odds, and, finally,
he died in a hand-to-hand combat.
He was attached to the Welsh
Guards. From 1936 up to the time
he joined the British Army, the de-
ceased was a Joint Master of the
County Limerick Hunt.

ANOTHER JAP GENERAL TO DIE

A Washington message received
this afternoon states that an
American Military Commission sit-
ting in Manila, have found General
Homma, who commanded the
Japanese forces in the Philippines,
guilty of atrocities. He was sen-
tenced to death.

Homma was accused of having
been responsible for the deaths of
16,000 American soldiers by com-
pelling them to undergo forced
marches.
