

OBITUARY

MR. D. DORE, CAMAS.

West Limerick has lost one of its most esteemed and respected residents by the death of Mr. Daniel Dore, of Camas, Newcastle West, which occurred on Thursday, 31st January, after a comparatively brief illness. Aged about 70 years, the deceased belonged to a family which gave many of its members to the Church. He was father of Rev. Father Bernardine Dore, O.F.M., Merchants Quay, Dublin, and brother of Sister Mary James, Fermoy. He was uncle of Rev. Dean Vincent Dore, O.P., Aquinas College, Ohio, U.S.A., and brother of Mr. James Dore, New Haven, Conn. Deceased was also brother of Mrs. John Joe Hough, Upper Maiden Street, Newcastle West, to whom, as well as the other members of the bereaved family, very deep sympathy will be extended. One of the most popular sportsmen in the area, the late Mr. Dore was in his day a well-known supporter of the G.A.A., and a footballer of no mean repute. He was also a leading patron of the local Coursing Club, and one of its most active and enthusiastic members. There were striking manifestations of public sorrow at the obsequies of deceased. All sections of the public were represented at the funeral, which took place on Saturday, 2nd February, from Raheenagh Church to Killeedy Cemetery.

MR. P. O'MALLEY, KILNEGARIFF

It is with profound regret we chronicle the death of Mr. Patrick O'Malley, of Kilnegariff, and formerly of Mountfune, Murroe, one of the oldest of the O'Malley clan. The deceased, who had reached an advanced age, was an extensive farmer, and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. The funeral, which took place on Friday, 8th inst., after Requiem High Mass in Ahane Church, to the family burial ground at Clonkeen, was of large proportions. He is survived by—Mgr. In a report on the estimate, the Manager stated:—
"The estimate for the expenses of the Limerick District Mental Hospital for the coming year shows a slight reduction. Although costs in the institution are still high and some items show a steady inclination to rise, the reduction is possible owing to the general improvement in the financial position of the Committee of Management. At the 31st March, 1944, the Committee faced a debit balance of £14,790, by the 31st March, 1945, this was reduced to £9,975, and I believe that the debit balance on the 31st March, 1946, will be slightly below £4,000. In the circumstances I feel justified in not asking you to clear this balance entirely in one year and I am suggesting that the balance be spread over two years and that £2,000 be raised in the coming year. During the present year, every effort has been made to keep expenditure within the estimate and I believe that there will only be slight over-expenditure on a few items. This means that the items shown in the estimate have been carefully calculated and should provide for the needs of the institution except for any unforeseen calamity. Needless to say, in a large institution of this kind, problems crop up from day to day which involve expenditure which could not be expected beforehand but where there is co-operation amongst the staff these can be reduced to a minimum. The successful working of last year's estimate is mainly due to Mr. P. Harnett, acting chief clerk, and he has been ably assisted by Mr. J. Barry, storekeeper, and Mr. W. Fannon, land steward. I would like to emphasise this because although the R.M.S. and myself give general supervision and advice on policy, etc., the daily task of watching the finances falls on the clerk and storekeeper.
"The R.M.S. and A.M. Officers, Drs. Kelly and Blake, have contributed largely to the general efficient working of the Institution and have been aided by the staff in keeping general working expenses down as much as possible.
"In the detailed figures you will observe an increase in the item for salaries and wages. I have allowed here for an increase in the emergency bonus and also for readjustments in the staff salaries if the new scale recommended by the Department is put into effect.
EXPENDITURE ON FARM.
"There is also an increase in the item for farm expenses because of the general increase in the price of cattle. I also have arranged to rent land at Rathard, near to the Mental Hospital farm, and this will mean an additional rent of £500 per annum. There can, however, be no question as to the value of the farm to the institution. The farm steward will be in attendance at your meeting to give particulars but there are a few main figures to which I would like to draw your attention.
