## FLYING BOAT TRAGEDY

### CHARLEVILLE MAN A VICTIM

On Wednesday of last week  
(writes our Charleville correspon-  
dent) a tragic occurrence took place  
near Lee on Solent, England, when  
Sergt. Michael O'Donoghue, wire-  
less operator and air gunner in the  
R.A.F., youngest son of Mr. Denis  
O'Donoghue (late G.S. Rlys.), 15,  
Broad Street, Charleville, and  
brother-in-law of Mr. Samuel Sher-  
man, plasterer, Main Street, was  
killed when a Sunderland flying  
boat, which was flying from Calshot  
to Sicily, crashed into the sea in  
flames. Nine other members of the  
crew were also victims, including a  
Sergt. H. O'Keeffe, air gunner, who,  
it is learned, also resided in this  
district for some years.

### POSITION OF TOWN SURVEYOR
