DEATH OF MR. MICHAEL HUGHES, M.A.

With very sincere regret we
chronicle the death of Mr. Michael
Hughes, M.A., Divisional Inspector
of Schools, Limerick, which took
place in St. John's Hospital this
morning, following an operation.
The late Mr. Hughes, who was in
middle-life, was a noted educationist
and a classical and Irish scholar of
a very high order. Before being
appointed to the inspectorial staff
of the Department of Education he
taught for some years in St. Pat-
rick's Practising School attached to
the Drumcondra Training College.
In 1921 he was promoted District
Inspector, being assigned to
his native Donegal. Later he was
transferred to Cork and eight years
ago he was appointed Divisional
Inspector for Limerick.

The late Mr. Hughes was a gentle-
man of many fine traits of charac-
ter and his death will occasion deep
regret and sorrow. Deep sympathy
will be extended to his widow and
five young children in their irre-
parable loss.

The remains will be removed from
St. John's Hospital at 6 o'clock this
evening to St. Michael's Church and
the funeral will take place on
Wednesday at 11 o'clock to Mount
St. Lawrence Cemetery after
Requiem Mass at 10 o'clock.
