The death of Mrs. Margaret Whelan, relict of Mr. Wm. Whelan, a former member of the Limerick Corporation, and who was a prominent figure in the Fenian movement, has removed from our midst a lady of many sterling qualities. She passed away at the residence of her family, "Celtic Villa," O'Connell Avenue, on the 27th ult. and the funeral which took place on the 28th ult. to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery from St. Michael's Church, was of immense proportions. The deceased lady was mother of Bro. Stephen, Cistercian Order, Mount. St. Joseph, Roscrea; Mr. P. Whelan, B.C.; Mr. D. Whelan, Newsagent and Stationer, and Mr. John Whelan, Engineer Instructor, City Technical Institute.

The late Mrs. Whelan, who had reached an advanced age, was held in affectionate regard and esteem by a wide circle of friends, especially by her neighbours who admired and loved her many kindly and Christian acts. Her husband, as stated, was an ardent Fenian and when a member of the Corporation he championed fearlessly and courageously the cause espoused by his leader—the late John Daly.

The funeral cortege, one of the largest seen in the city for a long time, was representative of all creeds and classes. It was headed by the Mayor (Ald. M. J. Hartney), the three City Deputies, the members of the Corporation and representatives of industry, trade and commerce.
