The following are the principal film awards for 1945 made in Hollywood on Thursday last, at the annual banquet of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Science (writes our Film Correspondent-"E.C."):-

Best Film-"Lost Week-End." Best performance by actor-Ray Milland in "Lost Week-End."

Best performance by actress — Joan Crawford in "Mildred Pierce." Best performance by actor in supporting role-James Dunn "A Tree Grows In Brooklyn."

Best performance by actress in supporting role—Anne Revere "National Velvet."

Best documentary film-"The True Glory. Best direction-Billy Wilder for

"Lost Week-End."

Best screen play-Charles Brankett and Billy Wilder for "Lost Week-End.

Best original song in films-"It Might Well Be Spring," written by Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II.

The prizes are gold statuettes. and the awards are based on a vote taken among 12,000 persons employed in the film trade in U.S.A. The present awards cover the production year from August 1st, 1944, to July 31st, 1945. The statuettes are familiarly known as "Oscars," a nickname coined by Bette Davis.
