### LATE MR. D. O'MALLEY

The death of Mr. Denis O'Malley, Drombanna, Limerick, has been learned of with very deep regret and sorrow. One of the oldest residents in the district, he was held in very high esteem and regard for his many sterling qualities. He was one of the foundation members of the Drombanna Co-operative Creamery Society, of which he was a member since its inception in 1912. He played a big part in the building up of this progressive enterprise, and in which he took a practical and lively interest, despite his advanced years, right up to his death. But, apart from the dairying industry, he was a leading agriculturist, and every movement calculated to advance the interests of the farming community found in him a worthy champion.

#### CHAIRMAN'S TRIBUTE.

At the last meeting of the Drombanna Creamery Society, Mr. B. Laffan, Chairman, spoke in eulogistic terms of the late Mr. O'Malley.

Moving the adjournment of the meeting as a mark of respect to his memory, the Chairman said that the deceased was one of the pillar stones of the Society. No group of men could have a more loyal colleague than Mr. O'Malley, and no man could have done more than he to place the Society in the forefront of co-operative enterprises. He was a grand old gentleman—kindly, charitable, straightforward. His death, in the fullness of years and after an active life in the service of his fellows, was deeply regretted. His genial presence would be sadly missed, but his personality and his spirit would live, inspiring them and acting as a guiding principle to those he had left to mourn his loss.

The Chairman then declared the meeting adjourned as a mark of respect.

Mr. P. Clohessy (Chairman) presided at a meeting of the Eastern Board on Wednesday night, when draws and fixtures in the championships were made. Eleven teams entered for the junior hurling competition and draws resulted as follows:—Cappamore v. Doon Ahane v. Murroe; Ballybricken Caherline; Pallas v. Fedamore; Patricks v. South Liberties, and Dromkeen a bye.
