The late Mrs. Frost was a kindly lady, charitable to a degree, and possessed many other fine traits of character that endeared her, not only to her immediate neighbours, but to hosts of people over a very extended area. She had four daughters in religion—Sister M. Austin and Sister Veronica, both at the Mater Hospital, Dublin; Sister M. Theckla, Royal City of Dublin Hospital, and Sister M. Kevin, St. Mary's, Limerick. Her only son, Mr. J. P. Frost, is a prominent figure in Irish sporting circles. He is a director of Limerick Greyhound Racing Track and a breeder of outstanding greyhounds and racehorses.
