## DEATH OF MR. D. A. HAYES

With deep regret we announce the  
 demise of Mr. Dermot A. Hayes  
 (Production Manager, Condensed  
 Milk Co. of Ireland, Ltd.), who  
 passed away unexpectedly early on  
 Tuesday morning at his residence,  
 14, Shelbourne Avenue, Limerick.  
 The deceased, who was a member  
 of a well-known and widely  
 respected Limerick family, being  
 son of the late Edmond and Hannah  
 Hayes, O'Connell Street, was highly  
 esteemed by and deservedly popular  
 amongst all classes. He was a  
 graduate of University College  
 Cork, where, after a brilliant course,  
 he secured the degree of Bachelor  
 of Science. Of a very kindly and  
 sociable disposition, he possessed  
 many fine characteristics that had  
 won him widespread confidence and  
 regard. Prior to taking over con-  
 trol in his important position under  
 the Condensed Milk Company in  
 Limerick he was manager of the  
 Company's branch at Tipperary. In  
 both places he was held in the  
 highest esteem by employers and  
 employees alike. His death at such  
 an early age—he was only in the  
 thirties—caused a painful shock to  
 all who knew him. An excellent hus-  
 band and father, he leaves a wife  
 and two young children to mourn  
 his loss and to them especially, and  
 to the numerous other relatives in  
 general, we extend our very sincere  
 sympathy. The remains were  
 removed at 9 o'clock on Tuesday  
 evening to St. Munchin's Church,  
 being followed by a huge and very  
 representative cortege. Solemn  
 Requiem Mass was offered up at  
 10.30 this morning and the funeral  
 took place to-day to Mount St.  
 Lawrence Cemetery, the cortege be-  
 ing of very large dimensions and  
 thoroughly representative in com-  
 position.
