The tragically sudden death of Patrick Murray, Munget, has left his widow and five helpless children totally unprovided for. A hard-working, industrious man, a loving husband and father, he cycled from Munget to his employment at Messrs. Spaight's day after day, irrespective of climatic conditions. Then, one morning, 2nd inst., just as he was preparing to begin his work, he had a heart seizure, and in a few minutes he had passed to his eternal reward.

Now the widow and five orphans, the eldest of whom is only fourteen years, are left without their bread-winner. Being thus reduced to straitened circumstances, their many friends are being urged to subscribe liberally to a fund, now opened for the bereaved family. Patrick Murray was well and popularly known throughout the county. In his youth and early manhood he identified himself with the G.A.A. He was first treasurer of the Munget Hurling Club, and, besides, he played for a number of clubs and, finally, was included in the County Selection. He was one of Munget's leading parishioners, and now that he has passed away it is confidently felt that his widow and children will not be forced to experience the rigours of want.

GREYHOUND NOTES

Saturday night is closing night for the St. Leger entries, and present indications are that the classic will include a number of really outstanding greyhounds which will make the event a colourful one. Almost 60 entries have been received to date. Those who catch the eye as much fancied candidates are Quare Times, the conqueror twice of Astra in the Easter Cup at Shelbourne Park. "Bill" Quinn's charge contests the final of that trophy to-morrow (Saturday) night, and recently went around the Clonmel circuit in 29.75 for the 525. Surely, on this form he will be installed favourite for the big Markets Field prize. Chrissie Tanist, who won the puppy cup at Clonmel, is another notable entry, while Darcel, winner of the Cork Easter Cup in 30.30, must have a bright chance. Lackadoon is another thought much of, while the home brigade will have strong representatives in Knocklong Castle, who scored in the fastest time of the season (30.60); Minadex, who gave the followers of Quare Tim something to think about when he extended the Ballydancer puppy in the Puppy Derby (coursing) earlier in the year. Minadex showed that he is just as speedy on the track when breaking 31 secs. in his first race. Rebel Abbey, the Abbeydale dog, winner of a trial in 30.48, may run better than he has done in the Easter Cup. Mr. F. Browning's Star Point, a much-discussed pup, will take his chance. Others which will be well supported are Prairie Pirate, Fair Coup, Ral Nutric, Quelp and Gay Temple.

Though the going was on the hard side at the Markets Field last week, nevertheless, some splendid performances were witnessed. Chief of these was the win of Knocklong Castle (by Castledown Lad) who clocked 30.60. Breaking well, she was never headed, and it was good form which Speed The Dawn (by Border Grande) showed in coming within 1½ lengths of Mr. J. Dunne's fawn at the finish. When winning in 31.10 on Thursday night, Rambler's Choice (by Irish Rambler) displayed good tracking ability. He was lying in the rear approaching the first bend where he hot to the front on the rails and overtook Park Walk, who incidentally will do better. Beggar's Seat by Manhattan Midnight had a run away win in the next. The time was 31.39 and his nearest attendant was Celbridge Rattler, who will be all the better for the experience. Charging Through (by Tiger Jazz) is proving a model of consistency. Again he was out away, and won by three lengths from Regis Boy who made a promising debut. Peg's Black Blackbird finished well, and was a head further behind, in 31.20. Mr. Jim Breen uncovered a useful Tiger Jazz pup in Carmel's Treasure. At the risk of the traps he was off in front and showed a fine turn of pace in doing 31.16, with Laurita Cross 7 lengths away.
