CLOSE CONNECTIONS WITH LIMERICK

Irish and Anglo-Irish Catholics have suffered a severe loss by the recent death of Canon Michael Shelley, who was instrumental in re-establishing the Catholic parish of Ushaw Moor, Durham, where he ministered as priest in charge for upwards of 30 years, the congregation meantime increasing twelve-fold, a beautiful church, commodious schools, and a neat parochial residence being established during his ministry. He was noted generally for his humility, his home-spun wit, his striking personality, and his close contacts with his flock, particularly the poor and unemployed. The funeral ceremonies, presided over by Right Rev. Dr. McCormack, Bishop of the Diocese, were attended by over 100 priests, including eight Canons, the President of Ushaw College preaching a fine panegyric.

The late Canon Shelley came of a family who had for generations given sons and daughters to the Church. Two of his uncles, the late Father John Shelley and Canon Kelly, were Parish Priests of Cappamore and Doon, respectively, and a brother, Rev. Philip Shelley, soon after his ordination died and was buried in Doon. The late Monsignor Nolan, P.P., V.G., Tipperary, and previously Administrator in Pallasgreen and Nicker, and Rev. Thomas Nolan, P.P., Kiltteely, were first cousins. Three aunts and three sisters of Canon Shelley became nuns. He was a native of Killenaule, Co. Tipperary.

In January the Canon visited Ireland, when he met many friends, including Mr. J. P. Walshe (Ambassador to Rome) and Commissioner Eamonn Mansfield.
