## PROGRESS OF EFFIN C.D.S.

The annual general meeting of Effin Co-operative Agriculture and Dairy Society, Ltd., was held at the central creamery on Friday of last week (writes our Kilmallock correspondent) and the large attendance of shareholders and milk suppliers included the following members of the committee:—Mr. Michael A. Carroll (Chairman), Mr. Thomas Carroll (Secretary), and Messrs. M. Cotter, David B. Walshe, John Foley, Daniel J. Kelly, P. Reagan, Michael O'Brien (Brickfield), J. Wallis, Michael O'Connell, T. Mullins, Thomas Mee, D. J. Nunan, Thomas O'Grady, Wm. J. O'Shea. The I.A.O.S. was represented by Mr. Nicholas J. O'Brien. The General Manager, Mr. Ed. O'Loughlin, was also present, and Mr. J. J. O'Donnell, Manager, Ardpatrick Creamery.

After the election of officers for the ensuing year, the auditor's report was then considered in detail.

The turn-over for the year amounted to £108,000, which showed an increase of £13,000 as compared with the previous year, an increase which was mainly due to an increased milk supply and to an increased turn-over in the agricultural and eggs store department. The total quantity of milk received was 1,479,065 gallons, and the average price paid for milk was slightly higher than that for the previous year. There was a nett profit on the year's trading of £313.

There was an excess of property and assets over paid up capital and liabilities to the extent of £2,389, showing that the Society was in a strong financial position.
