

WOUNDS ON THROAT

WEST LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH

Sitting at the home of the deceased with a jury, Coroner M. E. Cussen, solicitor, West Limerick, recorded a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence at an inquest on Henry Sheehy (33), a married labourer with one child, of Appleton, Feohanagh, who died from wounds on the throat self-inflicted with a razor.

Evidence was given by Patrick Sheehy, brother, that deceased rushed into a bedroom in his home and gashed his throat with a razor. Witness interfered, but deceased died after receiving medical and spiritual aid. Deceased, it was added, had been behaving strangely since he was unable to get a permit to go to England.

Dr. M. O'Connor, Newcastle West, said death was due to shock and haemorrhage resulting from an incised wound in front of the neck.

Sympathy was tendered to the relatives.

JEANETTE MacDONALD

RIVER TRAGEDY

DROWNING OF UNKNOWN MAN

Enquiries made by the Garda authorities have so far failed to establish the identity of a man, aged about 60 years, who was drowned in the Shannon at Russell's Pier, at approximately 5 o'clock, on yesterday afternoon.

It appears that he was seen by a woman descending the slipway at Russell's Pier, and when observed in the water the alarm was raised. A man rushed to the scene and succeeded in bringing him ashore, while a priest and doctor were requisitioned, and the Garda authorities informed. Artificial respiration was carried out on the body, which showed the faintest semblance of life. He was removed to Barrington's Hospital in the Corporation ambulance, where he was found to be dead on admission.

The deceased's height is given as about 5 ft. 9½ ins., fairly stout in appearance, and at the time of the fatality he was wearing a dark suit, while a cap was found on the steps.

An inquest touching the circumstances of the death will be held, without a jury, this evening.
