LIMERICK SHIP

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SALVAGE OF "MOYALLA"

ABANDONED

Salvage work on the Limerick Steamship Company's 684 tons vessel, "Moyalla," which ran aground and was badly holed on Black Rock in Galway Bay on February 17th, has been abandoned.

The vessel, which had been taken over by the Irish Government during the emergency, was restored to the Galway-Liverpool service last year.

The salvage vessel, "Help," which arrived in Galway on April 13th, had made satisfactory progress before the recent storm tore away the temporary patching and caused the vessel to settle down again.

FELL FROM SCAFFOLD

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CO. LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH

Mr. D. Ryan, Kilfinane, Co. Limerick, mason, unmarried, and aged about 60, fell from a scaffold about ten feet high, whilst working at Knocklong Church, some days ago. He was immediately removed to Croon Hospital, and later to a Cork hospital, where he died on Friday from his injuries.

FINE DISPLAYS

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BY LIMERICK RED CROSS TEAMS

Limerick Red Cross teams gave fine displays yesterday in the Munster finals of the Trophy Competitions held in the City Hall, Cork, four counties competing. They secured three firsts.

They came first in the President's Trophy Competition, securing a total of 751 marks, as against 704½ for Cork, 565 for Tipperary, and 506 for Kerry. In the Men's Cup contest Limerick City was also first with 367 marks, as against 340½ for Cork City, 296 for Tipperary Town and 269 for Dingle. The Ladies Cup was won by Newcastle West with 384 marks, as against 364 for Cork City, 269 for Clonmel and 231 for Dingle.

Competitions organised by the Red Cross were also decided at five other venues yesterday. At Galway, a Clare team won the Men's Competition and thus qualified to compete for the United Tramway Cup.
