Limerick Red Cross teams gave fine displays yesterday in the Munster finals of the Trophy Competitions held in the City Hall, Cork, four counties competing. They secured three firsts.

They came first in the President's

Trophy Competition, securing total of 751 marks, as against 7041 for Cork, 565 for Tipperary, and 506 for Kerry. In the Men's Cup contest Limerick City was also first with 367 marks, as against 340 for Cork City, 296 for Tipperary Town and 269 for Dingle. The Ladies Cup was won by Newcastle West with 384 marks, as against 364 for Cork City, 269 for Clonmel and 231 for Dingle.
