justily a system and had to act as jurors, come long distances, leave their own business to suffer all sorts of inconvenience, and then have to do unpleasant jobs without getting a penny towards their out of pocket expenses. He would like to suggest to the authorities who had power to amend the law in this respect that this matter might be worthy of consideration, and that the services of jurors might be even more efficient if this very real grievance could be ameliorated in some degree in future.
