FOUND DEAD IN CORK HOTEL

Dr. William Bennett (74), a native of Graigacurra, Croom, Co. Limerick, was found dead in his room in a Cork City hotel by a member of the staff yesterday afternoon.

The late Dr. Bennett, who had been staying in the hotel for some weeks, had practised for most of his life in England and retired about six years ago. Since then he had been living with his sister, Mrs. Sheehy, Kilmore House, Bruree, Co. Limerick.

Deceased was one of three brothers who qualified in medicine. Dr. Patrick Bennett and Dr. David Bennett have both been dead for some years. The late Dr. William Bennett is survived by another brother, Mr. John Bennett, Graigacurra, a well-known farmer in the district, and by his sister, Mrs. Sheehy, Kilmore House, Bruree.

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
