Subject to work being resumed the directors were willing at the earliest opportunity to have a conference at which representatives of the employees could bring up any alleged grievances. He suggested this (Monday) evening as being suitable for the proposed conference.

At a meeting of the employees it was decided to resume work this (Monday) morning, and to avail of the conference with the directors to discuss their grievance.
