

## WOMEN EMIGRATION TO BRITAIN

It has been decided by the Government to withdraw restrictions on women leaving this country for employment in Britain. The regulations on male emigration to Britain are still in existence and any man bent on seeking employment there will still have to register with the local offices of the Department of Industry and Commerce. The British authorities have already withdrawn their restrictions regarding the immigration of female workers from Ireland. This withdrawal will enable wives of Irish workers in all parts of Britain to visit their husbands there.

### FATAL FALL FROM ROSS CASTLE

A young English Army Captain, Donald Kingsford, lost his life when, on Monday, he fell from the tower of Ross Castle, Killarney. The tower is 100 feet high, and Kingsford, who was the first to ascend to the top that day, was found in a pool of blood at the foot of the Castle some minutes after he had mounted the steps in a very hurried manner. An inquest into the Captain's death was adjourned pending the attendance of deceased's relatives.

At the inquest, Supt. B. Harte said that in a lengthy and not very legible letter, deceased had made references to suicide. He had evidently served in the North African campaign, had been demobilised last year and had applied for appointment, without avail, to the Colonial Office.

### WANTED A CHEERFUL FUNERAL

The late Mr. Wm. Edward Allpress, of Reigate, Surrey, who left £208,550, stated in his will: "I express the wish that my funeral shall not be made a mourning affair, but that it shall be made as simple as possible, with all my family keeping up that old cheerful spirit which I have appreciated so much during my lifetime, and with the thought that I have had a good life—a good innings—and that we shall meet again hereafter. . . ."

### GLIN OLD AGE PENSIONS

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Mr. M. J. Carmoody, Ennis, has been informed by O'Dwyer of New York that he is expected to visit the town to whom Ennis Urban Council decided to give an award. Ennis decided that at the present time he is not planning any such visit. He added that there is apparently, a misunderstanding regarding his report that he had been his brother's agent in making arrangements to visit Ireland. He expressed his appreciation for the kind invitation Ennis, sent his best wishes and hoped to have the opportunity of visiting that "lovely town" when the pressure of business became lighter.

### FEDERATED CATTLE BREEDERS' UNION
