FELL INTO BOILING WATER

Thomas Hartnett, the two-year-
old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph
Hartnett, Lr. Maiden Street, New-
castle West, died at Croom County
Hospital on Friday night, 5th inst.,
from injuries received when he
accidentally fell into a container of
boiling water in the kitchen of his
home on Thursday of last week.
The mother, who was engaged in
the kitchen at the time, rescued the
boy immediately, but he evidently
received extensive scalds and shock.
After treatment by Dr. H. O'Connor,
the little boy was rushed to Croom
Hospital, where he died overnight.
Sincere sympathy will be extended
to the sorrowing parents on the
tragic occurrence.
