WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, July 10th Cattle—Entry not as heavy as last week; beef, full supply, wanted and sold well, especially prime medium weighted heifers and bullocks, which were in brisk demand at late rates. Nicely done fat cattle easily placed; heiferish cows sold w.t. Small entry of beef cows, no ready prime lots on offer; secondary and older sorts in fair demand at recent rates. In store cattle section no forward or aged cattle on offer; young stores comprised a useful selection, promising 1 year old feeding; bullocks and choice dairy heifers of the tight stamp found ready buyers, young cattle sold readily, with little change in general routine, values fully maintained, and a good wind up with satisfactory clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £33 10s. to £37; second run, £25 5s. to £29 5s. Fat cows, £20 to £27. Old, £10 10s. to £11. 2 1/2 year old heifers and bullocks, £17 10s. to £21 5s. 1 1/2 year olds, best, £15 2s. 6d. to £21; second run, £10 to £15.
Sheep—Substantial increase in entry, all pen accommodation filled, not as many good sheep as last week. Final buyers: Trade opened quiet, as owing to the heavy supply buyers were able to take matters easy. Medium weights in best demand, especially prime wethers and hoggets, which held their prices; the hot weather had its effects on heavy sheep, which were an easier trade; nice hoggets sought after; all round rates somewhat lower; secondary sheep and rougher sorts tedious and difficult to place, unless at reduced rates. Fat lambs a free sale at top rates. Store hoggets and lambs met steady enquiry. The run of values for prime fat sheep marked last day's currencies, but for secondary sorts easier rates. Considering the heavy supply an exceptionally good clearance effected. Fat middle weight, £15/- to £25/-; hoggets, best, £18/- to £22/-; second run, £10/- to £12 6/-; stores, 84/- to 98/-. Fat lambs, best, 75/- to 91/-; store lambs, £2/- to £7 6. Wm. B. Pitt & Co., Auctioneers.

In-calf and calved cows, best, £27 to £30 10s.; seconds, £24 to £26; others, £20 10s. to £23; small, £13 10s. to £19 10s.; in-calf and calved heifers, best, £26 to £28; seconds, £20 10s. to £24.
Stores—The entry in this department showed a substantial increase as compared with last week. Buyers were again in good attendance and bidding for the better quality animals was keen, a big portion of the entry being sold under the hammer. Secondary classes were also bid for and a considerable portion of this description changed hands. DOCTOR'S DEATH

MEMBER OF ESTEEMED FAMILY

The death occurred suddenly in a Cork City Hotel, of Dr. William Bennett, Graiguecurra, Ballingarry, at a fairly advanced age. A member of an esteemed County Limerick family, the late Dr. Bennett was son of the late Mr. Daniel and Mrs. Bennett (nee Fitzgerald), Kiltalea, Glin, and practised in Sheffield for nearly half a century. He was brother of the late Dr. David Bennett, London, who, in his teens, won a scholarship at the Crescent College, Limerick, tenable for three years, and another brother, Dr. Patrick Bennett, Gold Medalist in Surgery, who practised in Sheffield prior to his death some years ago. Another brother, Rev. D. Bennett, was a student at Maynooth College, when he lost his life in a drowning accident. He was also brother of the late Mother Magdalen of Laurel Hill Convent, Limerick, and of the late Mr. Michael Bennett, of Graiguecurra, and was uncle of Rev. Fr. Bennett, C.C., Southwark Diocese, England. The deceased, who practised for most of his life in England, retired some years ago, and his tragic death occasioned widespread sympathy.

The remains were conveyed by road from Cork to Granagh Church and following Requiem Mass there, the interment took place at Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, Limerick, in the presence of a very large and representative congregation that was representative of all classes, and testified in a great degree to the esteem in which the deceased was held.
