AGED COUNTY LIMERICK LADY

Mrs. Margaret Hehir, who had lived for the past seventeen years in New York City (writes a correspondent there), died at her home, 1234 Shakespeare Avenue, Bronx, New York, on June 13th, 1946, at the fine old age of eighty-two years. Born at Killonan, in the County Limerick, on April 6th, 1864, the daughter of John O'Brien and Kate O'Neill, she had many relations in and around Limerick City. Her father was with the Great Southern and Western Railway Co., as an overseer. A sister, Mrs. Michael Lahiff, resided at Annacotty, and another sister, Mary Anne O'Brien, of 3 Fort Villas, Roxboro Road, Limerick, died in January of this year. Messrs. John and William O'Neill, merchants, of William Street, Limerick, also John, and the late Margaret Griffin, of Rosbrien, and Mrs. E. Hurley, of Castle View Gardens, were relatives of the deceased.

In her early twenties she married Daniel Hehir, a railroad engineer, and they went to live at 10 Sallypark, Waterford City, where their children were born. Tom, Bridget and Johanna are deceased in Ireland, while Patrick J., Owen F., Kathleen and Mrs. A. J. Dean, live in New York, but they often recall many pleasant schoolday vacations spent at Killonan and vicinity. In 1929, after her husband had died, Mrs. Hehir went to New-York City in order to be near her family. She liked the new country very much, and soon was keenly interested in everything American. Later on she made a holiday trip back to Limerick City.

Her health was fairly good up to about four weeks before she died. In her last illness she was attended frequently by Rev. Father Donoghue, of Sacred Heart Church, who was at her bedside a few minutes before the end. Monsignor Humphreys, the Pastor, recited the rosary, and said other appropriate prayers with the relatives at 10 p.m. on Sunday. On Monday, June 17th, after Requiem Mass, interment took place at Gate of Heaven cemeny in Westchester County, N. Y. Rev. Fr. Hartgrove, a former chaplain with the armed forces, accompanied the funeral procession and read the committal service at the graveside. Mr. John Hodnett, undertaker, had charge of funeral, and all arrangements. Numerous Mass cards and messages of sympathy were received. May her soul rest in peace.
