

ACROSS RAGED FATAL SHOT IN GUARDROOM

SOLDIER DIES FROM WOUND

Evidence At The Inquest

An inquest touching the circumstances of the death of Private Martin Ryan, 28, Garvey's Range, off Broad Street, which occurred on Thursday evening last at Sarsfield Barracks, was held with a jury by the Deputy City Coroner, Mr. J. S. McNeill, solicitor, at Barrington's Hospital on Friday evening last.

IN THE GUARDROOM AS PRISONER

Corporal Anthony Frawley, "B" Coy, 12th Battalion, Sarsfield Barracks, said that he took up duty at 10.30 a.m. on the 11th inst., at Sarsfield Barracks, as Guard Commander. He saw Private Martin Ryan in the guardroom as a prisoner. He says that he was drunk on the night previous.

CLARE CONTROVERSY ACCUSED MAN BOUND OVER

During the day he saw the two prisoners, Ryan and Williams, in the cell, and they both appeared quite normal. At 3 p.m. Corporal Frawley went out to change the guard, and Pte. Boland with him. Witness was left behind and it was his duty to open the gate outside the guardroom and let them out. That left no one in the guardroom. Witness re-locked the gate to the guardroom. He was expecting Corporal Frawley to come to the gate when he saw him coming. He went out to open the gate and he heard a shot. It was witness's rifle which was used by the guard. At the time, and there were five bullets in it when witness put it on the rack.
